The Carbon Boarder Adjustment Mechanism is a policy instrument that charges climate-related costs to imported goods.

The start of CBAM

The Fit for 55 package presented by the European Commission includes reducing the emissions and becoming a climate neutral Europe in 2050. As part of this package, the CBAM regulation has been presented.

When is it happening?

The CBAM regulation started October 1st, 2023. Before the end of January 2024 importers need to upload the first reports. Followed by quarterly reports, which will become annual reporting in 2026.

What obligations do companies have?

Importers of CBAM-goods above €150,must report the embedded emissions. After the first report importers need to submit quarterly reports. This covers the following industries:

- + Iron and steel
- + Hydrogen
- + Aluminum
- + Cement

+ Fertilizer

+ Electricity
